Community Involvement Drives The Prevention Project's Newest Program

For decades, AWP's The Prevention Project educators have been working in Bucks County to break the cycle of domestic violence, and their newest program expands those efforts to further enlist boys and men in the important work of ensuring safe and healthy relationships for all. Read on to see how you can be a part of the innovative Coaching Boys into Men program!

Coaching Boys into Men (CBIM) is an evidence-based program that recognizes the unique and influential roles that athletic coaches play in the lives of young men. CBIM provides coaches of middle and high school age sports teams with training to promote respectful behavior to their players and prevent relationship abuse, harassment, and sexual assault.

Over the course of a season, CBIM coaches and players engage in weekly discussions that address themes such as personal responsibility, respectful behavior, and relationship abuse, as well as promoting teamwork, integrity, fair play, and respect. This is all done with the support of AWP's education staff.

Coaches play an influential role in the lives of young men and positively influence how they think and behave on and off the field. During talks with the team, practice sessions, game days, or in casual conversations, coaches have numerous opportunities to teach that violence has no place in relationships. Coaches involved with CBIM, whether they be in a school setting or in a community sports league, reinforce the benefits of healthy relationships and anti-violence, helping AWP in our efforts to stop the violence before it starts.

And with the athletes involved, there is a chance for the CBIM message to be spread to others. Athletes are often popular among their peers and those that display character traits such as integrity, respect, cooperation, and a peaceful nature can serve as positive role models for fellow students.

AWP began CBIM coach trainings in early January of 2017 and to-date, nine coaches have completed the training program. Teams currently implementing CBIM include Central Bucks West High School's football and baseball teams as well as the Warwick Bulldogs Little League baseball team. AWP is excited to see Bucks County's youth continue to be leaders in preventing violence in our schools and community.

Your Gift Helps AWP's Clients Take STEPS On Their Road to Flourishing

We've all seen "before and after" photos for miracle weight loss products or exercise routines. If only it were that easy. Of course, the big lie about all before and after photos is the promise of going from start to result without any of the really important work in between. For survivors of domestic violence, it's not a giant leap from crisis to recovery, but rather a series of steps: some forward, some backward, but all crucial footholds on the road to flourishing.



That's what AWP staff had in mind when they had the notion to revive the organization's decades-old STEPS program. Designed in the 90's to provide a space to exchange feelings and ideas for clients past their point of crisis and in a place of safety, STEPS addresses the trauma and pain of abuse that live on long after a client reaches out to AWP. In the words of the STEPS program introduction, "We are so busy trying to make things right for our abusive partners that we forget who we were before, what our hopes were, what we dreamed of doing. We live our lives in survival mode for so long that we tend to carry that with us into our future."

With critically important discussion topics such as healthy relationships, building coping skills, trust, grief, loneliness, and sexuality, the 10 week STEPS supportive counseling and support group program serves as an important avenue for expression, healing, and growth. STEPS is offered to all AWP clients who have passed their point of crisis and are ready to begin their journey to finding themselves anew.

"I couldn't believe how good it felt," said a STEPS participant, "I'm like a whole new person. I can walk out and lift my head. People are now greeting me with a smile." Her story is the story of so many STEPS clients.

"It simply filled a need," said Linda Thomas, Director of The Safe Options Project. "Bringing STEPS back was a clear need for our clients, and we are really happy to have it going again."

The revitalized and reimagined STEPS program is now fully implemented within The Safe Options Project and offers clients a structured outlet to explore not just who they can be in the world, but who they can be for themselves. The road to flourishing is not the same for everyone, nor is it an easy path to walk, but thanks to your generous support, AWP is proud to help clients find the STEPS to get there.

Your Support of A Woman's Place First Response Program Makes This Vital Resource Available to Bucks County's Domestic Violence Victims

hen you give to AWP, you are directly bringing safety to domestic violence victims by supporting the work of AWP's First Response Program. First Response is on call 24/7 to administer free emergency counseling both during the time of immediate crisis and for the duration of the victim's DV ordeal. Called to the scene by the victim, an emergency room doctor or nurse, or law enforcement, it is AWP's First Response advocates who reassure clients that they are not alone on their difficult journey.

From January through mid-April 2017, AWP's First Response team, consisting of Manager Sue Bell and Advocates Erika Flayer and Caitlin Lavorgna, assisted with 76 crisis calls and worked with 209 referral clients. "Because AWP is the only domestic violence agency in the county, we're the only people doing this work," says Erika. In addition to committed staff members, AWP's First

Response team relies on dedicated volunteers to provide assistance outside of business hours.

Once a client calls AWP's 24-hour hotline reporting that they have

been a victim of domestic abuse, the call gets transferred to First Response. "First and foremost, we ascertain if the victim has a safe place to go, and then we determine the continued assistance we need to provide," says Sue. "We make sure the client and their family is safe. We get them clothing and food if needed, we help them make their police report. We go to court with the victim, starting with the preliminary hearing and going all the way to trial. We walk them through the entire criminal process and advocate for them with the police and district attorneys. The complete process can take months, and it's our job to stay connected with the victim to help them see it through to the end."

Sue is a ten-plus year veteran of domestic violence work, and served victims in Hunterdon County before coming to AWP in the summer of 2016. Erika has been working for AWP for almost five years and is passionate about the criminal justice system, meeting community members, and advocating for victims of domestic violence.



Caitlin's interest in domestic violence advocacy began when she worked in a shelter in Cape Town, South Africa while studying abroad in college, after which she focused her studies on domestic violence and sexual assault.


